lacemat Fun

Supplies...


- gridded ruler with 45° markings
- rotary cutter and mat
- sewing machine
- iron



Materials...

To make 4 placemats 131/2" x171/2":

- 0.4m main fabric for placemat centres (0.9m if using a directional print!)
- 0.15m contrast fabric for flat piping (optional)
- 0.3m complementary fabrics for top and bottom panels
- 0.15m complementary fabric for side points
- 0.5m for corner strips
- 0.9m Thermolam (not included in kit)
- 1.0m for backing
- 0.45m for binding (optional)
- coordinating thread (not included in kit)



- 1. Accurately cut your fabrics in the following manner:
- Placemat Centres: 4 rectangles 14"x9" each (Pay attention to print direction, if applicable, and embellish or embroider before cutting!)
- Flat Piping (opt): 1" strips. Fold in half lengthwise and press wrong sides together. Sub cut into eight 10" strips, eight 5" strips, and sixteen 31/2" strips.
- Top/Bottom Strips: 3" strips; sub-cut into 8 pieces 3"x10".
- Side Points: 3" strips; sub-cut into 8 rectangles 3"x5½".
- Corner Strips: 3" strips; sub-cut into 16 rectangles 3"x11".
- **Thermolam:** cut into 4 rectangles 21"x17"
- Binding (opt): cut into 2½" strips; fold in half lengthwise and press wrong sides together. To join lengths, place ends perpendicularly and stitch at 45° angle.

Puttin' It Together...

- 1. Lay 9"x14" rectangle of centre fabric on cutting mat. Place your ruler with 45° line along top edge, lining up 1½" line with corner. Cut off all 4 corner triangles. Centre main fabric rectangle on 1 Thermolam rectangle and press carefully (avoid gluing your iron).
- 2. Optional: Starting with top and bottom edges, attach piping by matching piping raw edges to rectangle raw edges and stitching down using very scant 1/4" seam. Repeat with side edges, then corners.
- 3. Attach top and bottom strips in same manner, this time using 1/4" seam. Finger press, then flip and iron onto fusible batting. Repeat with side points and corner strips. Trim away excess fabric from seam allowances, then press into place on batting.
- 4. Trim to size by placing ruler at one side, parallel with centre rectangle edge, with ruler edge 1/4" beyond the point (so not to lose point). Trim, and repeat on all sides.
- 5. There are two options for completing your placemats:
- Place backing fabric onto placemat, right sides together and sew 1/4" seam all around, leaving 3" opening to turn. Turn, press, and slipstitch closed. Finish with topstitching, if desired. Or,
- Place backing fabric and placemat wrong sides together, and bind as you would a quilt.
- 6. Repeat above instructions for each placemat. Have Fun!

THUNDER BAY QUILT GUILD PROFILE AILA METSA

Aila was born and raised in Thunder Bay. She is the second youngest of three girls. Aila is proud of her Finnish heritage, and as her dad was a baker, with the old Kiivela Bakery, and her mom a baker's assistant, she learned at an early age the art of making Finnish Coffee Bread. When Aila was in grade 9, the bookkeeping teacher asked the class if anyone was interested in working in an accounting office, up went Aila's hand, and so started the career in accounting.

Aila's first introduction to sewing was through the "home-ec" classes that started in grade seven. The first project was an apron, and a very square boxy blouse with a round collar and a draw string at the bottom. Remember those?? Now that apron turned out really nice, but the cut on that blouse – yuk. The only way to fix that was to go to the Eaton's store, where they sold patterns and fabric, and make something more pleasing to the eye. This is was the start of an obsession. The old Singer treadle sewing machine had never seen such action. As there was not a lot of money to buy clothes, sewing them was a great solution. Her mother was not a sewer, but had a sewing machine for mending clothes. By the end of the first year of classes there were all kinds of skirts, dresses, slacks and tops.

Aila continued to sew clothes, always buying more and more complicated patterns, until she was making tailored suits and coats. The time constraints of working full time and tending to three wonderful children, eventually left sewing on the back burner. Then somewhere along the line, around 1999, Aila happened to see an add in "The Key" for a quilting class. She has no recollection as to what triggered her to sign up for the class, as no one she knew quilted, but sign up she did. Now an obsession renewed, but in a different format.

The first quilt was a sampler quilt in purples, greens, blacks. As grandchildren came along, more quilts were required. Then in or around 2006, she found about a Guild meeting, so she attended, and was blown away with the talent. There were all kinds of quilts on display around the room, and the guest did a trunk show on Quilt Art.

The lady showed her various projects that looked like photographs, but in fabric. She decided that she wanted to be a part of this wonderful group.

Attending the Guild meetings opened up new "learning" doors. There was always some new fabric, a new method, or a project someone had done, to learn something from. Everyone was so enthusiastic and willing to share their ideas and show you how. Unlike some other groups where one-ups-manship is the game, at the Guild, members are willing to stop right in their tracks and show you how to do it.

Like most members in the Guild, Aila's stash has blossomed into what can only be described as a mini quilt shop. There is usually no specific pattern in mind, when she leaves a quilt store, with a bag full of fabric, however, there is usually an inkling of a idea that it will make a perfect something at a future date and she just has to have the fabric, as it will likely disappear within an hour after she leaves the store, so there is absolutely no reason to be distraught by not having purchased it.

With still being in the "work world", it severely cuts into Aila's quilting time. She likes to take as many classes as time permits, to learn about different quilting techniques, how to use the many quilting tools out there, and of course find about creative ways to use up that ever growing stash.

Aila has been on the Executive of the Guild, as Treasurer, since 2009 and on the Quilt Bee Committee since 2011. All this has been a wonderful experience. Aila has made a lot of new friends, and the learning process is continually stimulated. What a wonderful past time and hobby!! What more could a person ask for.
